## Write-in candidate for Malone Village Trustee

I'm Pat Ward—the dad in the photo, below. I'm asking you to vote for me for Village Trustee on November 6<sup>th</sup>. I'm not on the ballot; you would need to write in my name where indicated on the ballot. (Turn over for details on how to do this. It's really very simple.)

The Village has some big decisions to make—decisions that can no longer be swept under the carpet. One being whether to “dissolve” the Village government. I don't think “dissolution” is necessary. I've studied the report on Village finances prepared a year ago by Armory Associates (Sept. 2011), a Syracuse firm specializing in forecasting financial risks. The report paints a bleak picture for our financial future. Nevertheless, I believe that an energized, creative Village Board can weather the storm without scuttling



the ship—without resorting, in other words, to “dissolution.” One of the keys is working smoothly yet swiftly and resolutely with the Town Board on shared services. Secondly, it's vital that the Village keep its police force intact. As Attorney Kevin Nichols put it, “A police force is a mark of civilization.” Malone is a civilized community, and I will not allow it to be taken over by slumlords, drug dealers, and foul language and other violent behavior on our streets.

I was raised in Brasher Falls and have lived 31 of my 33 years in St. Lawrence & Franklin Counties. Liz (my wife) and I have been blessed with 3 marvelous kids. I'm a graduate of SUNY Canton (1999) and I am an ordained minister, having “pastored” 2 North Country churches. (Currently I'm Associate Pastor of the Bangor Baptist Church.) A year ago, Liz & I started a modest business venture of buying distressed, multi-family houses within the Village, fixing them up, and renting to decent tenants. ## OFFICIAL ABSENTEE BALLOT FOR GENERAL ELECTION - HOW TO VOTE

1. Mark in pen or pencil.
2. To vote for a candidate whose name is printed on this ballot, fill in the voting oval  to the right of the candidate's name like: ●
3. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on this ballot, write or stamp his or her name in the space that appears at the bottom of the column containing the title of the office.
4. To vote on a proposal, see reverse side of ballot and fill in one of the voting ovals  contained in the box setting forth such proposal like: ●
5. Any other mark or writing, or any erasure made on this ballot outside the voting ovals or blank spaces provided for voting will void this entire ballot.
6. Do not over vote. If you select a greater number of candidates than there are vacancies to be filled, your ballot will be void for that public office or party position.
7. If you tear, or deface, or wrongly mark this ballot, call the Board of Elections at (518-481-1663) for instructions on how to obtain a new ballot. Do not attempt to correct mistakes on the ballot by making erasures or cross outs. Erasures or cross outs may invalidate all or part of your ballot. Prior to submitting your ballot, if you make a mistake in completing the ballot or wish to change your ballot choices, you may obtain and complete a new ballot. You have a right to a replacement ballot upon return of the original ballot.
8. To be counted, absentee ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than the day before Election Day and be received by the Board of Elections no later than 7 days after Election Day.
